

All aspects of the field are evaluated through multiple online evaluation surveys. Our Field and Student Teaching Liaisons work to place candidates in rural, suburban, and urban field placements; an urban experience is required for graduation. Candidates must complete a dual-entry field journal, maintain a field hours log, and write field reports about the school context.

 - 1. Past Hiring and Recruitment Trends: DeSales University formed a consortium of local area schools, educational institutions, and industries employing education majors called the DeSales Partners in Education Consortium. There are now almost thirty signed partners. We communicate to the DPEC partners about opportunities at DeSales in an effort to identify possible hires in high-needs areas. 2. Needs of Schools and Instructional Decisions: The DeSales University teacher preparation program works closely with school districts to address new state and local initiatives. For example, our student teachers were prepared in the implementation of Student Learning Objectives (SLO) projects concurrent with the state roll-out of the new Teacher Evaluation System which includes SLOs. In line with the new evaluation system, our students are fully versed in the Danielson Framework for Teaching and are assessed using the Framework descriptors. All graduate level future teachers take a course in Data-Driven Instruction with a local district data leader. 3. Special Education Teachers and Core Subjects: Per PDE regulation for certification, all special education teachers must hold an Instructional Certification in a content area. 4. General Education Teachers working with students with disabilities: All teacher candidates must take three courses in

Accommodations and Adaptations for students with disabilities or challenges per PDE requirements. 5. General Education Teachers working with students with limited English proficiency: The skills for teaching English language learners have been infused throughout the curriculum. In addition, all graduate students take ED 515 (Foundations of English Learners) are taught by highly experienced professors in the field of ESL and are evaluated as the most rigorous courses in the curriculum. Teacher candidates must demonstrate planning that they differentiate for diverse student needs in planning and instruction. All teacher candidates must demonstrate sustained experience in fieldwork with English learners. 6. General Education Teachers working with low-income families: All of our teacher candidates will be placed in a high-needs school for at least one third of their pre-student teaching hours. Secondary certification students begin their field experience in a middle school in an urban district. Moreover, discussion of the unique needs of students and families living in poverty are woven throughout courses in the program. 7. General Education Teachers in urban and rural schools. All teacher candidates in order to move into student teaching must demonstrate a significant field experience or multiple experiences in urban schools. In the first field course across all certification areas, students are assigned to an urban placement. In the third field placement, students are assigned to a district that encompasses a rural area within the district. Students will reflect on the specific demographics of the district, especially related to rural poverty. From the basic introductory course (ED 500 Foundations of Education) throughout the teacher education curriculum, issues of urban education including inequalities of funding, urban challenges, working with urban families and communities, and other topics are discussed. Further, teacher candidates must demonstrate in each course that they have advocated for under-served comm

DeSales University students are well-prepared for the use of technology in the classroom. Candidates must demonstrate a broad range of technology skills in project-based assessments. Teacher candidates take a mandatory orientation to SmartBoard technology just prior to Student Teaching. Teacher candidates are required to include multimedia in all planning documents (unit plans and lesson plans), and they are assessed on their integration of technology during instruction by their University supervisors. In addition, teacher candidates are taught to collect data on the achievement of their students and to use that data in instructional decision making. Students receive instruction in universal design principles in the course on teaching English learners (ED515) as we talk about baseline instruction of what is good for ELs is also beneficial for all learners. Universal design is also integrated into all of our courses focusing on students with special needs. In addition, we have recently added more focus on universal design in our instructional design and planning courses. DeSales University faculty members have undergone additional professional development in technology. In a move to a high-quality, hybrid model all faculty members participated in training on the design of high-quality instruction for online classes, utilizing the principles of universal design. Faculty were introduced to new technologies such as Panopto and Zoom. All faculty members are assessed on their growth in these areas yearly, both through a self-assessment and through a technology-ready program offered by our Distance and Instructional Technology Department.

As part of the teacher preparation program, teacher candidates are required to take several Accommodations and Adaptations courses at the graduate level specifically related to effectively teaching students with both low incidence and high incidence disabilities. Students learn and practice using research-based strategies and techniques that can be used to accommodate students with special needs in an inclusive classroom. They learn how to differentiate instruction and how to provide the supplementary aids and services needed for the student to be successful in the LRE and as outlined in the student's IEP.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*.

The Accommodations and Adaptations courses also focus on preparing the teacher candidates to participate as members of the MDT/IEP team. Course work includes: learning about the MDT/IEP process, identifying the role of each member of the team, identifying the components of an IEP, providing supplementary aids and services, identifying programs and related services, addressing transition, meeting timelines, understanding special education terminology such as due process, NOREP, LRE, and FAPE and being in compliance with the law. Through lecture, discussion, inclass and out-of-class assignments and evaluation, teacher candidates are prepared to participate as members of the MDT/IEP team. They watch video clips explaining the MDT/IEP process and are then asked to summarize the process. Their textbook reading assignments and related articles, as well as lecture with Power Points, inform them of the process. They also participate in hands-on activities such as a mock IEP meeting, writing goals and objectives, and identifying supplementary aids and services. They are asked to critique a sample IEP.

c. Effectively teach students who are limited English proficient.

All teacher candidates at the graduate level must take the ED 515 Foundations of English Learner Education course, entirely devoted to adapting instruction for English language learners in the mainstream classroom. The course is taught by experienced faculty whose specialty area is ELL education.

Students in the Special Education program take a rigorous load of courses to qualify for the new Special Education PreK-12 certification. Students take courses in High-incidence and Low-incidence disabilities, transition, collaboration, inclusion, assessment and IEP development, and positive behavior management. Students must complete 170 hours of field work prior to student teaching, which includes working with students with disabilities in a range of grade levels and a range of disabilities, including low-incidence and high-incidence. Course instructors are leaders in their field with practical experience in the profession of Special Education.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities*Education Act.

All students in the Special Education program take a course entitled, Assessment and IEP Development. Course work includes: learning about the MDT/IEP process, identifying the role of each member of the team, identifying the components of an IEP, providing supplementary aids and services, identifying programs and related services, addressing transition, meeting timelines, understanding special education terminology such as due process, NOREP, LRE, and FAPE and being in compliance with the law. Through lecture, discussion, in-class and out-of-class assignments and evaluation, teacher candidates are prepared to participate as members of the MDT/IEP team. They watch video clips explaining the MDT/IEP process and are then asked to summarize the process. Their textbook reading assignments and related articles, as well as lecture with Power Points, inform them of the process. They are asked to not only critique a sample IEP, but also create new plans based on case study data.

The course is taught by experienced faculty whose specialty area is ELL education. The course is reportedly the most rigorous in the program.

DeSales University is a small Catholic university located in suburban Center Valley in Eastern Pennsylvania. Approximately 3,300 undergraduates are enrolled. Although our setting is rural/suburban, within ten miles is the Allentown School District, a district experiencing significant challenges with issues of poverty and significant numbers of English Language Learners. The Bethlehem School District, five miles north of DeSales, is a district known for its cultural, linguistic, and economic diversity. So, it is essential that the DeSales pre-service teacher be prepared for a classroom that is diverse in all respects. Teacher candidates can earn certification through two routes: undergraduate and graduate. The undergraduate program serves primarily residential students who are seeking a traditional college experience. Students who enter the M.Ed. Program are divided into two streams: 1) certified teachers seeking additional certification or endorsements, and 2) students seeking initial certification. DeSales University requires that full-time faculty teach in the M.Ed. programs as well as the traditional day program to assure continuity of curriculum and ensure quality. Assessment of program quality is accomplished through student evaluation of courses and instructors, graduating student survey immediately after graduation, and alumni survey. In addition, all certification competencies are assessed through examinations, project-based assessments, and standardized teacher exams. The results of the assessments are fully reviewed each May during the Education Department's Assessment Retreat. In addition, assessment and program monitoring is on the agenda at the monthly department meeting.
